16. INTERRELATIONSHIP OF BUILDING AND SURROUNDINGS: This building faces south from the north side of College Street between Main and Broad Streets. To the east is the parking lot of the Farmer's & Mechanic's Bank, and to the west is a colonial house to which this structure was once attached as a dependency. Across College Street is a vacant theater and lot

18. HISTORICAL OR ARCHITECTURAL IMPORTANCE: This structure is the only known eighteenth century artisan's shop in Middletown. It was built around 1759 for Thomas Danforth (1731-1782), a renowned pewterer whose impact on the industry is measured by the artistic quality of his work, his innovative business practices, and the large number of pewterers he trained, including his six sons. Upon his death in 1782 the business was taken over by Thomas's son, Joseph Danforth. Joseph Danforth's house stands just west of this building (see form for 122-124 College Street).

An Italianate front was added to the original structure probably when it passed out of the Danforth family in 1866. More recently the building was divided for use as apartments. A site investigation and an old map view recreate the approximate original appearance of the Danforth Pewter Shop. It displayed a two story, three-bay, gable-to-street facade with entrance in the east bay. The forge chimney stack (now removed) rose from the center of the 17'x35' structure. Danforth family probate records list assortments of pewter in the shop; it apparently was used as both store and shop. The second floor was probably
